James (*MacGregor*), who assumed the name **Drummond**, played a conspicuous part in the '45 rebellion, and was wounded at Prestonpans. He was later accused, along with his brothers Duncan and Robert, of **abducting a rich young widow**, Jean Keys, and forcing her to marry Robert. He was **tried in 1752, but escaped to France**, where he died in 1754 (about 59 years of age). He is said to have **left a family of 14 children, of whom one**, Gregor Drummond, **became a butcher in Edinburgh**. A letter written by his daughter Malie is in the National Library of Scotland
